Module 1: "North American Studies Across the Disciplines"

Contents and objectives:

This module provides an interdisciplinary perspective on the historical, theoretical and sociocultural foundations of North America's diverse cultures. Students will participate in classes from different departments and disciplines. Relevant subject areas include questions of history, literature, culture, race/ethnicity, religion, education, and gender. By approaching these concepts from various disciplines, such as historical studies, literary studies, cultural studies, and educational sciences, participants will be able to gain insights into North America and into its being shaped by transnational and transcultural processes, both in the present and in the past.

Depending on the courses on offer at any given time, this module will provide experience in the following skills and fields of knowledge:

- Introduction to U.S., Canadian, Mexican, and Caribbean histories, literatures, and cultures
- Knowledge of migration, cultural exchange, and transnational education, particularly between Germany and the United States
- Development of an understanding for North American regions in their Western and non-Western contexts
- Insight into the concepts and theories of transnational education, race/ethnicity, gender, religion, culture, and politics

In total, three seminars are mandatory, covering at least two different disciplines. One of the three seminars needs to be completed with a research paper (3.500-5.000 words).

B.A. students can as a rule only participate in B.A. courses, while M.A. students can take part in all Certificate courses, the instructor's permission provided. Graded term papers need to be written according to the length and standards of the student's level at the time of participation in the class in question.

Module 2: "Study North America: Theory and Practice"

Contents and objectives:

This module offers participants the opportunity to explore not only different aspects of North American cultures, but also different forms of studying and doing research. This module thus allows students to both deepen their knowledge in regular courses as well as to choose between other formats of research and practice, and thus to develop a complex perspective on the historical, theoretical and socio-cultural foundations as developed in Module 1. Participants may choose from a wide range of cultural activities, either abroad or at home in Germany, and thus gain some substantial experience of North American cultural diversity.

Students choose a minimum of three thematic (transdisciplinary) clusters (two, if study abroad is one of them) to achieve a total of 15 LP for Module 2.

On completion of this module, students will have:

- Gained relevant practical or academic experience abroad and/or
- Been exposed to North American culture/s by working at a cultural/political/economic institution
- Been exposed to varied academic experiences by taking part in conferences, colloquia, language classes, workshops, or summer schools
